Fr Bob writes ... in baptism the Lord is adding to our number those whom he is calling

We will all have seen, and maybe received a greeting card that says "Life begins at forty" or thirty or fifty.

Don't believe them, for life begins at baptism. Baptism is the quintessential 'sign of life', Jesus himself spoke of baptism in terms of strict obligation: 'unless one is born of water and the Spirit, he cannot enter the kingdom of God' (John 3:5). Baptism was the substance of his final earthly command: 'Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptising them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit' (Matt 28:19). When new believers asked St. Peter what they should do, he infallibly declared: 'Repent, and be baptised every one of you' (Acts 2:38).

Just as our natural living cannot proceed without a birth, so our spiritual life cannot proceed without baptism.

Early Christians moved easily from the baptism made popular by John along the River Jordan to their own water ceremony. They required it for commitment to the new Way preached by Jesus and for membership in their community of faith. At first it seems that new Christians were accepted into the community through this water ceremony without much formal preparation, but it wasn't long before persecution made it important to test candidates for their sincerity, both to protect the community and to meet the challenges that lay ahead, the Eucharistic liturgy was usually only witnessed after baptism.

Baptism became associated with the annual Easter Vigil, adults being tested for up to three years while they were instructed, supported in their withdrawal from pagan practices and loyalties, and taught to live a new way. Only then were they admitted to candidacy for baptism. Finally, during what would become Lent, they received intense instruction, submitted to exorcisms and other special rituals, fasted on Good Friday and Holy Saturday, and were then baptised during the night of the Easter Vigil. (I tell parents and Godparents when they come to a preparation class how lucky they are – it didn't used to be the

priest giving them instruction for an hour on a Tuesday evening!!)

Over the centuries, Baptisteries became prominent features of churches, basilicas and cathedrals, some being elaborate separate buildings. Others were built into the entry or vestibules of the place of worship, or some close to the sanctuary. In some the elect were fully immersed, usually three times and in others they stood in shallow water, with the waters of baptism poured over them. Immediately after the water ritual the newly baptised were anointed with sweet smelling oil – the Oil of Chrism. Then they were dressed in white robes that they sometimes wore all of Easter week, and holding a burning candle they were led to the altar for the Eucharist.

The ending of Roman persecution for Christians in the 4th century brought religious freedom and becoming a Christian was the popular thing to do, there was a period of mass conversions to Christianity as the church and state blended together. And eventually most of the unbaptised in Europe were new born infants, and by 11th century babies were baptised as soon as possible after birth – this was a consequence of a high infant mortality rate and the conviction that the unbaptised could not be saved. Adults were baptised in private and the ordinary celebration of baptism became associated with infants, a rather simple service, usually held on a Sunday afternoon with godparents and a few others present. Seldom was the mother present for two reasons. First, baptism usually closely followed birth, and second, the mother was considered 'unclean' until a ritual of purification was performed.

Baptism is the first of the Initiation Services, the first stage of our journey of discipleship, a welcoming into the Christian fellowship, and so it is important that the Christian family are there to greet and welcome the newly baptised into the fellowship on the Christian community, and this must surely be around the altar of the Eucharist.

I began by saying that baptism brings us life – new life, and on 4th December, we in this Parish of Paignton, will through the Induction of Fr. Roger, be baptised into a new life, to share in his ministry and that of Gayna, to support and sustain them as

they come to lead us on the next stage of our development as we journey on our pilgrimage as disciples of Christ.

Fr. Roger and Gayna we welcome you into the fellowship of this Parish of Paignton.

The ringers had a surprise birthday party for John on his 75th birthday in September. Ringers from Devon and Somerset joined him for a day's ringing in Somerset starting at North Curry. After lunch ringing took place at the heaviest set of 10 bells in the world at Wells Cathedral. The evening finished with a celebratory meal at the Redwoods Inn, Uplowman, Tiverton.

Bells at Christmas

Bells are always associated with churches and the religion of Christianity. The sound of bells announces the birth of Christ on earth. It is said that with Christmas the use of large church bells to call the faithful to worship may have been started by Bishop Paulinus of Nola (431 A.D.) in Campania. For many, the holy sound of church bells ringing out on a Sunday morning brings

to mind the Lord's commandments. Their pitch and rhythm indicate joy, warning, or sorrow so that the community might rejoice with the joyful, and mourn with the sorrowful. Bells are symbolic of the harmony existing in the society. It acts as a medium between heaven and earth, bells and especially their clappers, represent communication and suspension between humans and God.
