Autumn into winter. It's a time of year I like: the closing in after the summer; the wind and the rain and the dark; the crackle of a real fire. It seems to mark the beginning of the end of the year's journey.

We all need to close in sometimes. We need to retreat, to feel cosy; to recharge.

But it starts to go wrong if that is all we do. I really don't like the phrase, it's used far too often, but it's true – life is a journey.

The bible is full of journeys: think of Abraham, Moses and David; think of Mary and Joseph, Paul – and Jesus himself. All of them on journeys, just like you and me.

The Christian journey isn't just about movement: it's more than moving from one thing to another. The Christian journey is about moving on, but it's also about growing, and about deepening. The Christian journey encompasses the material, but it is also a journey of spiritual depth.

As we take temporary shelter in the autumn of our various journeys through this life of ours, it is right also to be looking to where the next move might take us. Richard Dahlstrom, a Christian writer, suggests there are five stages to journeying that might help us move forward in accord with the intention of God for our lives.

*There's a hearing.* Our prayers, our conversations, our dreams and our songs, when listened to attentively, may start to tell us where we need to be looking next. We're searching for God's call now, in the large things of life and in the small.

*There's a wrestling.* Here we take the things we've heard and we try them and test them against our hopes and beliefs, against what we know and what we think we need. It's a wrestling between the call of temptation and the pull of the divine.

*There's a response.* After we've consulted, discerned, we make a decision: we

stay, or we go. The decision determines the journey.

*There's a preparation.* We put in place the things we need to have in place to move on to what is new. Without preparation we just launch ourselves forward without what we need in those initial stages of the new journey to carry us along.

*There's a leaving.* We go out, we reach out. But we also leave behind, and sometimes that can be hard – for us and for others.

There is perhaps no better time to listen for that call of where to move to next than in the closing in of the journey that has been your year so far.

As you hear the wind and the rain, as you hear the crackle of the fire – take the time to listen, too, for where God might be calling you next in your life.

Whilst I was putting the September magazine together at the vicarage Sandra had suffered a seizure and I returned home to find paramedics inside and ambulances outside.

Thankfully my daughter was on hand to take care of things but as is ALWAYS the case Hugh was at near panic stations.

But as the ambulance sped away with me soon to follow I headed for my quiet

place to pray expecting a long 'pleading' session but instead before I could even fall to my knees I saw in clear white letters in my mind's eye John 11 verses three and four.

I immediately checked and read: "And the sisters said 'Jesus your friend is ill' and Jesus said: 'This will not lead to death but life so the Son of Man can be glorified!"

Given Sandra's frail state of health at times that was precisely what I needed to hear: I had been given a promise – Sandra was going to be fine.

After two days in hospital Sandra was discharged although scans had shown a 'lump' in a difficult area.

Holding onto God's promises in such circumstances, and I don't care how spiritual people claim to be, is not easy but God is faithful.

The tests came back inconclusive but another outpatient's visit and examination showed no problems after a couple of weeks of intense anxiety.

Somehow we all clung on to that promise and I am certainly not claiming some great spiritual triumph – I rarely have them.

God knows when we need help in a big way and supplies the triumph – it has nothing to do with us. Thank you Lord for that promise – thank you for answered prayer and forgive my inability to often take you entirely at your word.

## Welby: Be church for the poor



**The church has heard a fresh call to be "a church of the poor for the poor" in recent years, the Archbishop of Canterbury has been reported as saying as he commissioned volunteers to help churches engage with issues of credit and debt in their communities.**

The first phase of the Archbishop of Canterbury's Church Credit Champions Network is on course to secure benefits worth over £2million for local communities.

It is estimated that this activity will generate a social return of around £7.50 for every £1 invested in the programme, largely through reduced interest payments as people use low-cost credit unions rather than payday and other high-interest companies.

In his sermon at London service to volunteers he said: "Those of you who are being commissioned have heard God's call, as the whole church has in a new way in recent years, to be a church of the poor for the poor, to seek justice and the common good for all in our society.

"You have set up credit union access points in your churches, brought new people onto the boards of local credit unions, supported people struggling with debt through signposting them to debt advice resources."

He added that the credit champions' role must ultimately be to point to Christ.

He said: "I urge you to point to liberation, to the true value of humanity which is given by God, not money."

The Network is in the process of training 300 'champions' who are volunteers from local churches. They help people in their churches to think about and take action to tackle issues to do with credit, debt and money in their local area.

Churches have carried out mass sign-ups to credit unions, set up branches in church buildings, volunteered as board members, and encouraged local employers to set up payroll saving for their staff. The programme is on target to bring in 3,000 new credit union members from the pilot phase.

Churches have been at the centre of the campaign to introduce a cap on the total cost of credit to limit the amount that payday lenders could charge – something which finally came into force in January 2015.

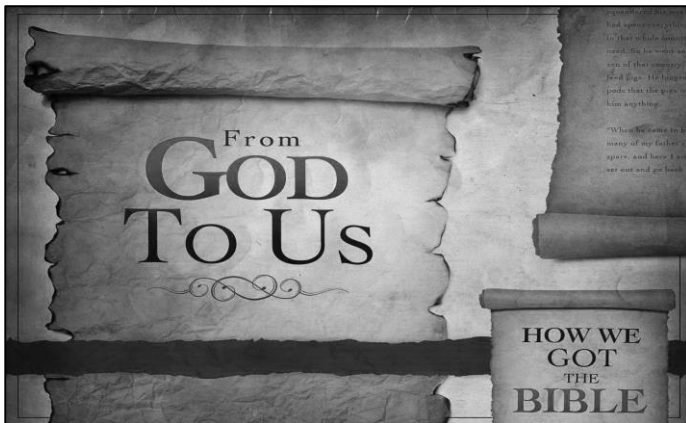
But as the Archbishop himself has said, regulation alone cannot deliver the required cultural change. Churches are now building on the necessary changes at the legislative and regulatory level by making sure that people have access

to better alternatives and to free, high-quality, debt advice when needed.

The Archbishop set up the Task Group on Responsible Credit and Saving in 2013, led by former City regulator Hector Sants.

## How we got the Bible



Christians forget that there was a time when the Bible did not exist, or else there was only part of it. The preparation which ended with the books of the Bible which we all have today took several centuries!

How many church men and women today know how we got our Bibles?

Whenever you buy a book with a title like, "How we got our Bible" you find that the title could have been, "How we got the Bible in English". It is very hard to find a simple book which really does tell us how the books of the Bible were chosen and put together.

So far as I understand this area of history, the process by which the books to go into the Bible were chosen was like this: During the centuries immediately before the birth of Christ the Jews in Israel/Palestine gradually worked out which books should be counted as "sacred scripture".

Yet it was not until after Christianity was founded that they finally settled matters.

It was, in fact, in the year A.D. 90 that a Jewish council met in a place called Jamnia and finally agreed which books should be included in their Holy Scriptures.

The books which the Jews agreed on were the 39 which we Christians now have in our Old Testaments.

Meanwhile the Jews living outside Palestine, (who were called the Hellenistic Jews because they were Greek-speaking) worked out their ideas as to what should be included in their sacred scriptures.

They arranged their Bible in a different sequence or book order, and included other books as well.

Some of these extra books had originally been in Hebrew, but others had originally been in Greek.

So, in the end, the Hellenistic Jews had a "Bible" containing 54 books, while the sacred scriptures of the Israel/Palestine Jews had only 39 books.

### **What did the first Christians do about this?**

I read that they did not worry too much as to exactly how many books ought to be included.

However, after Henry VIII's days, the Roman Catholic Christians kept all 54, the Calvinists and English Puritans just used the 39, while Luther and the Church of England said that it was the 39 which were really important, but that the other books were, (to quote from the 39 Articles of the Church of England), "for example of life and instruction of manners".

The additional books from the "Bibles" of the Hellenistic Jews are called:

1. The First Book of Esdras
2. The Second Book of Esdras
3. Tobit
4. Judith
5. The Additions to the Book of Esther
6. The Wisdom of Solomon
7. Ecclesiasticus
8. Baruch
9. The Letter of Jeremiah
10. The Prayer of Azariah and the Song of the Three Young Men

11. Susanna
12. Bel and the Dragon
13. The Prayer of Manasseh
14. The First Book of Maccabees
15. The Second Book of Maccabees

All lumped together, people call them "The Apocrypha".

You may wonder why it is that most of the Bibles on sale in Anglican, Evangelical and Protestant bookshops do not contain the Apocrypha.

One reason is, (I am told) that, following the Puritan influence, the "British and Foreign Bible Society" never print Bibles with more than 39 books in the Old Testament.

If you want a Bible with all 54 books in the part before the New Testament you have to say, "I want a Bible complete with Apocrypha".

### **Who decided which books should be in the New Testament ?**

Letters from people like Paul were kept and often shared round among Christians in different places. (The book of Ephesians may have been a "circular letter" from the beginning).

There were also collections of our Lord's sayings and records of his life, death and resurrection.

It is hard to discover which New Testament Books were regarded as "Holy Scripture" in the early days of the Church.

One list, dated about 200 A.D. includes all the books we have in our N.T.s except the Letter to the Hebrews, St. James, and St. John's third Epistle.

Possibly the last book to be recognised as suitable for the Christian's Bible was the "Revelation of St. John the Divine".

Books not included, (as not sufficiently reliable or accurate), were called, "Acts of Paul", "Hermas", "The Apocalypse of Peter, "The Epistle of Barnabas" and the so-called "Teaching of the Apostles".

It was not until about 400 A.D. that the books we now have in the New Testament were agreed by the Council of the church to be authentically inspired by the Holy Spirit and true to everything everyone knew about Jesus and the apostles.

So it was gradually, under the guidance of the Holy Spirit, that the decisions were made and we got the Bibles we know today.

The Bible has been translated from the original Hebrew and Greek into many hundreds of languages, and the work of translation is still going on today.

## Such honesty in a daily devotional

***Very rarely have I found a daily devotional dealing the realities of day to day living. This one found its way into my life late last month from Dr Micha Jazz. I'm glad it did. Hope it helps you. Ed.***

*The other night I was awake at 2:09am. I just knew I wouldn't get back to sleep. I tossed and turned for a while, and then got up and made a cup of tea. Inside I felt wretched.*

*An argument with my daughter the day before revolved around my head. I knew that our family was facing big and testing decisions. It all felt like a mess, everything slightly out of control; a scenario that only seemed more devastating given that it was the early hours of the morning and I felt entirely alone.*

Yet life goes on from one day to the next. At times this is exciting, as when anticipating the visit of a friend or a celebratory event. On other occasions it seems relentless and requires every effort simply to hang on to the coat-tails of the dawning day ahead.

The psalmist reminds us that seeking God is not an inspirational, one-off activity. Rather, it is the practice of a lifetime. When it is this latter lifestyle, when we are driven to the limits of our human capacity, we are able to release ourselves into God's hands.



**For me, this is seldom a great act of spiritual triumph, more the grudging acknowledgement that I have chosen to rely on God and the memories of times when God has shown up, even when from my perspective he has been late!**

**Stress is real and needs acknowledgement. Such an acknowledgement doesn't remove it, yet it does accept the reality. Once stress takes hold, it is difficult to shift.**

However, no matter how low you feel, reflect upon the psalmist's encouragement and seek God. Your mind may be constrained by the anxious thoughts that lay siege to you, yet God will protect your heart, and the very discipline of choosing to seek God will awaken faith memory within and lead you on. If you haven't taken time to build any faith memory, start today.

## Bishops call to government on migrants

Church of England bishops want the government to do more in response to the worldwide migrant crisis and called for at least 50,000 Syrian refugees to be taken in over the next five years.

The CoE has released a letter, signed by 84 bishops, which was sent to Prime Minister David Cameron in September, urging him to make a "meaningful and substantial response to the scale of human suffering we see daily".

Amid mounting public pressure to strengthen Britain's response to the migrant crisis on Europe's borders, the Government pledged to take in 20,000 Syrian refugees over the next five years.

The bishops write in the letter: "We believe such is this country's great tradition of sanctuary and generosity of spirit that we could feasibly resettle at least 10,000 people a year for the next two years, rising to a minimum of 50,000 in total over the five-year period you foresaw in your announcement.

"Such a number would bring us into line with comparable commitments made by other countries. It would be a meaningful and substantial response to the scale of human suffering we see daily."

The bishops also pledge to encourage their churches to provide housing and foster care to refugees as well as to support the Government in its efforts.

## Haven Torbay faces new challenge

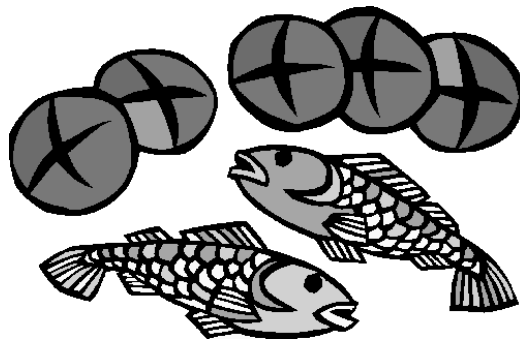
### **The Good news**

More tea is being drunk, more breakfast toast, more tins of beans, as well as more people wanting a bag with a few basics in to tide them over in their bedsit or a blanket or a coat for life sleeping rough! More opportunities to show the love of Christ in very practical ways!

So as a result of your prayers we need to increase our regular income! The short fall is about **£300 a month**. We would really like to recruit more people ready to set up small standing orders – five pounds a month would be wonderful, or more if you can – and of course if you pay tax, you can sign the Gift Aid form allowing us to claim another pound or taxman. Some of you have already done you very much indeed. When Peter saw five thousand people needing a meal, he thought Jesus ought to send them all away to find food. But Jesus had a better idea – feed them ourselves from our slender resources – which he amazingly transformed to be enough for everyone. We are asking you to help with a similar issue. We can trust Jesus to do his bit, but he may be wanting you to lend a hand as well.

## Diocesan Synod agrees 'growth fund'

A new fund set up to encourage churches to reach out across their communities has been set by diocesan synod.

The new 'growth fund' will consider proposals for projects that aim to reach out to more people and introduce them to the Christian faith.

The first proposal, which was approved on Saturday, will help churches in 25 areas to serve planned new housing developments of around 600 new houses. Such developments are planned for areas from Ilfracombe to Axminster, Tavistock and Plymouth.

The fund will go on to consider more proposals that seek to further the three priorities set out by Bishop Robert, to grow in prayer, make new disciples and serve the people of Devon with joy.

Bishop Robert said: "The purpose of such a fund is to support and invigorate the excellent work that is going on at grass roots level because that's what is important and it's where change will happen."
