Dear Friends

I hope you are excited by the things that are happening around us in the life of the church in the parish. St Andrews Hall re-opening, the Alternative Service beginning to revive, Baptisms rooted in our worship, reengagement with the richness of the Liturgy and the regular daily round of worship continuing as we wait on God and his leading.

It is now 9 months since my induction, long enough to conceive and give birth in human terms! The Autumn looks to be a time of some labour pains and happy events! The staff team and others have been looking at ways in which we can reach out to the communities we serve and soon to arrive will be the 'Silver Service' designed particularly for those who are older. Afternoon tea and a short informal service at the end will we pray help us to meet the needs of those in the community and draw them into the fellowship of the church. A group has been working since March on planning special events for families, with young people also in mind, and they launch their first event at the end of October. Also in October initially once a month will be an evening service of worship, but which will include an opportunity to hear a talk and maybe discuss it afterwards (!) This will be designed to help us learn together and deepen our faith. A new group for those who wish to explore the Bible will be on offer (DISCIPLE) and this will not require that you know anything about the Bible at all, or even you know how to find your way around it!

The first of all these special occasions is Sunday 25th October, 'Back to Church Sunday'. Special invitations will soon be available, but this is an occasion to invite those whom we know to come back to church. If you know someone who used to go to church and doesn't anymore,

or you have a family member, friend or neighbour who has never been, this will be a special opportunity to invite them to come with you. Just think how our congregation will look if we all brought one person with us! This is a national initiative, but we can make the most of it here in Paignton.

I am writing this on the feast of St Bartholomew. Some sources suggest he went to India to proclaim the Gospel, and there is an ancient tradition that he was flayed alive in Armenia, and another that he wrote his own gospel but that is lost today. That is about all we know of him. But it is enough: anyone who was willing to trek to India to preach the gospel, to walk back to Armenia to be flayed alive is not someone to be ignored. Before that, he had allowed his Jewish faith to be challenged by a strange preacher and then, after watching him die a cruel death, he was willing to say that he had indeed had breakfast with a man who was horribly crucified three days earlier.

Greatness does not just come in the field of sport (even though our cricketers are great!) but what about the greatness of radical discipleship? The greatness of staking everything on the truth that Jesus Christ is the Son of God? That is why we celebrate Bartholomew. He may not have hit the headlines as some of the disciples did but he was one of the twelve, he was there with Jesus for about three years, he gave up everything for what he believed.

What underpins a life like that? What makes for a life of day in, day out, devotion to God?

First there is immersion in God's word and if you are a Christian but are not reading the Bible regularly, why not? The Bible tells us that the devoted person gets out and about among all kinds of people and is a person of prayer, setting his heart to pray to the God who made him.

In remembering Bartholomew, we celebrate the daily routine of ordinary discipleship, of getting on with the tasks in hand, underpinning them with routine devotion, and our Baptism reminds us we are called to be involved in God's name in the world where we live.

It's time to labour and to rejoice!

400th Anniversary of the King James Bible

The rota will be on the notice board at the West End from mid September, so please sign up with a friend and later we will fill in any gaps. Even if people do not wish to read themselves, they will be very welcome to come into the Parish Church at any time – they may even hear bits of the Bible they've never heard before!

The church is heated, there is a sound system and Readers will be able to sit. Silent coffee will be served between 10-11.30am, silent lunch 12noon-2pm and silent afternoon tea 3-5pm. Silent coffee will also be available during the evening session. Any help for these times will be most welcome, and also church 'sitters' for outside the usual times.

Readers may like to arrange sponsorship. We are planning to support the Interdenominational Dorcas Trust in providing Bibles for the desperately poor street people of Manila in the Philippines and materials to help them understand the Word of God. 

Coach Outing to the Area West of Dartmoor

Hand Bell Ringing leading up to Christmas

The hand bell ringers will now start practising for ringing over the Christmas period. The majority of the money raised in the past has been donated to Dame Hannah Rogers Trust, a non-maintained residential special school, which provides for students with severe physical difficulties.

Over the last few years the special educational needs of students have become more complex. Students' learning needs include moderate, severe learning difficulties to profound and multiple learning difficulties. Many have cerebral palsy and complex, medical and therapeutic needs, sensory impairments and associated learning difficulties.

If you would like to help the hand bell team out in any way, or want to try hand bell ringing, or believe there is another charity that should be considered, please come and see us, we practise on Tuesdays from 7.30pm in the church.

No particular skills are required to ring hand bells, although flexible wrists and a sense of timing will help. We visit the many clubs, pubs and hotels in Paignton leading up to Christmas and over Christmas usually ending with a ring at a few more locations on New Year's Eve.
