

FR TUBBS WRITES

So here I am, almost at the end of April, and we still haven't had that last letter, that final piece of paper, which says, You've got the house! We are slowly downsizing, but still don't know the exact size of the rooms in our new house, so still don't really know what we can take with us and what we must leave behind - or rather, get rid of (I don't think the Diocese would approve if we left anything behind!)

All this waiting takes place during the great Fifty Days of Easter. I love the season of Advent, though it is so often taken over by Christmass. I love the season of Lent - yes, I love Christmass and Epiphany too. Yet it is Easter which gives me the greatest spiritual uplift. Paul talks about fighting wild beasts (1 Cor 15.32) which, of course, he doesn't mean literally. Many of us face wild beasts during our lives. Illness, redundancy, divorce, unemployment, childlessness, bereavement, disappointments great and small. These are our wild beasts. They are bereavement situations. Yet for us as Christians these wild beasts, these bereavement situations, are not the end. They do not have the final hold on our lives. The resurrection had to be preceded by the crucifixion. It was out of the betrayal by one of his companions, the abandonment by all his close friends, the betrayal - with a kiss - the pain, the suffering, the agony, all preceded the resurrection. It was in his death that Jesus conquered. It is finished! was a great shout of triumph, not an expression of failure.

All our wild beasts, our bereavements, our sufferings, our pain physical, mental, spiritual, cannot compare with the sufferings of Jesus, which were so bad that he wonders whether God has in fact forsaken him. Yet out of that suffering comes the triumph of the resurrection.

The funeral service now contains a prayer which begins,

Your mighty power brings joy out of grief and life out of death

It goes on to pray for those who mourn and asks that God will give them patient faith in times of darkness and that he will strengthen them with the knowledge of his love.

I would not want to diminish or trivialise anyone's suffering; many of you have borne great pain at times during your lives, and some of you are bearing it now. At the same time I would be failing in my duty as your parish priest if I did not remind you that as death is not the end, so suffering and pain, from the least to the greatest suffering and pain, is not the end. The resurrection is not over and done with; it is a miracle that still takes place every day, in your life and in mine. We meet with the risen Lord every time we say our prayers, every time we make our communion, every time we read the Bible - and every time we relieve the suffering of others.

The risen Jesus still bore in his body the marks of the nails and the spear. Indeed, it is the definitive way of recognising him. Luke tells us

that the risen Lord says to the disciples on that first Easter Day, Why are these doubts coming up in your minds? Look at my hands and my feet, and see that it is I myself. John tells us that the risen Lord invited Thomas to put his fingers in the nail holes and his hand in the wounded side. Yet he is risen, conquering sin and death, for you and for me.

So continue to enjoy these great Fifty Days, and in the midst of your tribulations great and small, give thanks for your share in Our Lord's passion, and for his promise of sharing in his resurrection.

His death had occurred on the most important of all Jewish feasts, the Passover. His resurrection fulfilled all that the Passover had meant to them as Jews. It was an exodus, or passage, from the old times and the oppression of slavery to spiritual freedom. Jesus was the Paschal Lamb, slain to achieve this freedom.

Eastertide comes to a close this year on the last day of May, the feast of Pentecost. This is the day that Fr. Tubbs has chosen to complete his ministry among us, and I hope that we will all join together for the service at 10.30am to give thanks for his and Gwyneth's ministry to the parish of Paignton.

Sounds From the Belfry

On Good Friday if you heard the Parish Church bells ringing you may have noticed that the bells were rung in a different fashion with a haunting sound to them. That was because the clappers that swing inside the bells were covered on one side with a leather cap. The bells had two different sounds, one was the normal (open) louder sound and the other is a softer sound, this is the side that is muffled and it gives an echo-like sound.

This type of ringing can be on solemn occasions and often people request the muffled sound on the death of someone. Traditionally the bells were rung muffled at the passing of the old year and on midnight the bells were rung open to welcome in the New Year.

For those who may feel that ringing church bells could be too strenuous, there are 65 steps to the ringing chamber, you may wish to consider ringing the hand bells. We have a budding hand bell team who collect for charity. The performances are mainly in the run up to

Christmas but we practise throughout the year. The hand bell team has also rung at fetes and other festive occasions. The ringers do take bookings and have been asked to ring at weddings, the last one being at Forde Abbey. If you would like to learn more or wish to participate, the hand bell practice night is from 7p.m. on every Tuesday and lasts for 30 minutes. The Paignton Church Bell team came first place in the Deanery in October and qualified to ring with the best two ringing teams from six other deaneries. That competition was at Chudleigh on 18 April and Paignton came a commendable 9th position. The marking was very close and the ringing was very enjoyable and even the weather was pleasant with some beautiful sunshine for the whole of the day.
